| Landmark District: a distinctive geographic area of the City that contains a large number of high style buildings, many worthy of landmark status and other highly intact historic buildings from the same period of construction.   | All work to the exterior of a building in this district is reviewed. Very few changes from the original design are permitted. | Historic Commercial District: a geographic area of the City that contains historic buildings that were originally constructed for commercial use.  | This district is intended to preserve the form of<br>the area as well as the general character of its<br>individual structures. | Architectural Conservation District: a geographic area of the city that collectively contains a number of buildings constructed in a similar architectural style or sharing a similar time period of construction.   | This district is intended to preserve the form of<br>the neighborhood as well as the general character<br>of its individual structures. | <b>Protection Area:</b> a geographic area that contains some historic buildings or landmarks, but contains a large number of either non-historic or altered buildings.   | This district is intended to protect the general form and character of the district. More emphasis is placed on the area as a whole rather than individual structures. Generally, review of work in this district includes demolition, new construction, and additions with limited review of changes to individual design features. | Whaley Street, Earlewood, Governor's Mansion,<br>Old Shandon/Lower Waverly, Seminary Ridge,<br>Waverly    |
